


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A Message from the CEO

I am thrilled to tell you about our first year in our new building location at 5130 Masthead St. NE. Just as we had anticipated, we have expanded our programs, and are



serving more people in New Mexico than before. We have the capacity to continue growth and have launched our new Center for Advocacy and Education with great anticipation for new programming. The impact has been steady, and we are already hosting in-house events and meetings for the community. The space has provided us a safe way to bring people back to the office and provide continuous services.

The future of The Arc NM is a continued fight for the rights of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities; life in the community and the funding and services that can help get them there. Furthermore, we must support efforts to keep the waitlist for services down in New Mexico. But we will need to focus on issues such as increasing home and community-based services funding to address the crisis in our system of care, and we must support pay increases for direct support providers to help deter critical staffing shortages and provide more support for unpaid family caregivers. Finally, we must support the movement toward alternatives to independence such as supported decision making.

We hope that you enjoy this report from The Arc Family as we are proud of our continued advocacy and where we are going!

TO OUR COMMUNITY

Strategic Highlights

Our mid-year started with the loss of one of our beloved advocates, Mr. John Foley. He was a great teacher, father, mentor and friend to us all, but his passing motivated us even more to move our mission forward. We can feel his legacy every day with the high standards he set as we evaluate The Arc's standing in our community.

Our plans to implement new program growth and new programming and events have come to fruition over the past year but we still have a lot of work to do. We recently renewed our sexual assault victim advocate grant, hired new team members, and have gone from hosting meetings and events 100% online, to face to face events. We are finally able to begin in-person community outreach. After a long wait of developing a unique way to honor our consumers who have passed away, we installed a beautiful *Tree of Remembrance*. But the best accomplishment for me is building a team of very dedicated staff and leadership that has provided an excellent infrastructure and capacity to manage what is in our future.

While the Trust, Guardianship, and Representative Payee programs continue to be our anchor programs, the Public Policy program has developed into more interaction and outreach within the community, and we are excited to integrate the strategic planning process with our outreach and public policy efforts this fall. The Advocacy and Education program has enhanced victim advocacy support, financial inclusion and education, and the initiation of the training and education function for staff and consumers.

Finally, we can now see the path for the next few years by focusing on our strategic planning process. Sprinkled about in this report are some data points for each program.



Mission and Focus

The mission of The Arc of New Mexico is to protect the human rights of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and to actively support their full inclusion and participation in the community throughout their lifetimes. We have continued to support this philosophy by focusing on legislative priorities, developing our programs, and implementing new ideas for ensuring these rights are upheld.

Financial Highlights

The Arc of New Mexico had tremendous financial investment growth during most of 2021, and while we remain in a healthy financial state, our financial investment team is keeping a close watch on the current volatility of the markets. 2022 is yeilding investment losses with the risk of inflation in today's economy. Our financial summary shows an increase in net assets, with also an increase in expenses in our new building. With the growth of our programming, we anticipate the expenses to level off.

Operating Highlights

The Arc of New Mexico sold the Carlisle building and established a building reserve fund. We worked on upgrades to the building over the last year, focused on environmental impact by installing LED lighting throughout the building, and updated the property landscape with a xeriscape design. Both of those improvements resulted in thousands of dollars in City rebates, as well as lower utility costs. We also had LED outdoor security lighting installed throughout the exterior of the building and secured a recycling bin for responsible refuse disposal.

additionally, we increased our funding streams with a grant renewal at nearly twice the amount from previous years, increased our typical contract amounts due to opening up, along with planning for the use of our retention credits.

Major contributions and accomplishments

Major accomplishments this past year included the hiring of two excellent program leads and one manager. The impact was immediate as there were recent turnovers in sexual assault services and general advocacy, and we had to build capacity. Both the new advocacy and education director and our public policy officer hit the ground running on some much needed and timely work.

The major accomplishment of the year was the sale of our home office of more than 20 years, a small building on Carlisle NE. The sale resulted in the establishment of a building reserve investment account to protect and support our new building's improvements over time.

Other accomplishments in the past year:

- Awarded three full education scholarships to students with developmental disabilities.
- Hosted a hybrid-style Disability Rights Awareness Days conference.
- Hosted the well received, in-person, The Arc Moving Forward annual conference and Self-Advocate Summit.
- Established a Wall of Remembrance as an art installation to honor former clients and others who uplifted the lives of people in the disability community in extraordinary ways.
- Received awards of nearly \$100,000 in new grant funds.





Sexual assault statistics for persons with I/DD

- 90% of all people with developmental disabilities are likely to have experienced sexual assault. (2007 Bureau of Justice statistics special report on crime against people with disabilities)
 - 49% of people with developmental disabilities who have been sexually assaulted will experience 10 or more sexual assaults in their lifetimes. (According to Leigh Ann Davis, Director of the National Center for Criminal Justice and Disability)
- "These crimes go mostly unrecognized, unprosecuted, and unpunished" according to Joseph Shapiro, NPR Journalist, January 8, 2018.
 - Individuals with developmental disabilities who live in private family homes are 7% more likely to be sexually assaulted than individuals without developmental disabilities. (Department of Justice statistics provided to NPR for the program, "The Sexual Assault Epidemic No One Talks About" January 2018)



Public Policy followed the hottest policy issues over the past year. The elimination of the DD Waiver Waitlist is the single largest accomplishment by the State in securing the rights of people with disabilities and their access to necessary services and supports.















How are decisions made today?

Another developing policy issue is the establishment of alternatives to traditional guardianship. The Public Policy Officer was assigned to the Task Force reviewing Supported Decision Making, and the CEO was appointed to the WINGS group assessing guardianship reform.



The Arc of New Mexico Representative Payee Program has continued to slowly expand while adjusting to the "New Norm" of life in general. The Arc of New Mexico Rep Payee Program is now overseeing 110 STABLE accounts.



The Guardianship program continues to remain steady with plans to assess additional services. Over the last two years the program has experienced many pandemic-related challenges. The program maintained an average of 176 clients despite barriers to visitation, deaths, and transfers.
